²⁰ Jesus looked at his disciples and said,

"Happy are you poor;

the Kingdom of God is yours!

²¹ "Happy are you who are hungry now;

you will be filled!

"Happy are you who weep now;

you will laugh!

²² "Happy are you when people hate you, reject you, insult you, and say that you are evil, all because of the Son of Man! ²³ Be glad when that happens and dance for joy, because a great reward is kept for you in heaven. For their ancestors did the very same things to the prophets.

REFLECTION TIME



Short Reflection for All Saints Day by Revd Lis Arnold

The word "saint" conjures up a variety of images and notions. Someone who is perfect perhaps? Someone who is very holy and pious?

One image that springs to mind for me is of a stained glass window – looks perfectly o.k. until the sun shines through it and then it shines with light and glorious colours and becomes very special. I think a saint could be like that – someone through whom the love of God shines through in their loving actions and ways.

Then there are the famous saints that we know about. St Francis of Assisi, St Teresa of Avila, St Patrick, St Paul and St Peter. Could we be sure they were always "saintly"? I expect some of them could be difficult to live with. Some had very extreme ideas about mortifying the flesh – standing all night in icy sea water for example, going in for extreme regimes of fasting etc.

So we can see we are on slightly difficult ground when we try to define what makes a saint.

In the New Testament, there are references to "saints" and they refer to all the new Christians in the communities establish by Paul (Ephesians 1:15 NRSV) says, "Keep alert and always pray for the saints ", he says in Ephesians 6:18. In his letter to Philemon Paul says, "Your love has given me great joy and encouragement because you brother have refreshed the hearts of the saints." Are we then saints in our Christian communities?

So "saints" is not a single category nor is it easy to define.

Technically speaking, saints are "holy ones", in Greek "hagioi", the blessed of God, "makarioi". And it is this blessedness that Jesus focuses on in his Sermon on the Plain which is our Gospel reading for today. And of course it includes the Woes, in direct contrast to the blessedness.

Jesus focuses his ministry on the poor, the hungry, the crying, the hated, the ostracised and powerless. They are always his focus. They have nothing – nothing to insulate them from the harshness of life. They know they are at the bottom of the pile – people like tax collectors and prostitutes whom Jesus says will go into the kingdom first because they believed John the Baptist's call to repentance. they know their need of God. They are blessed. The rich and comfortable are protected by their wealth and worldly possessions and are not aware of their need of God. We have to be very careful as we too can fall into that same trap of complacency. It's alright to have wealth, health and power, what is important is what you do with them. And that they do not come between us and God. the woes are directed at that sin.

So, finally, I think that saints are those people who show the love of God in their lives, who know their need of God and try to do his will. They may be Premier Division Saints like the historically famous ones or they may be people we see everyday doing remarkable things because they care about their neighbour. There were, and are, many saints during this present pandemic who risk their lives for others.

Jesus says this. "Do to others as you would have them do to you" – it's a good code to live by and could be the foundation of sainthood! Amen.

Spend time in prayer for:

-those who are struggling to make ends meet during the pandemic

-those who are having to travel to get to work but who are scared too of being close to others.

-those in authority that they may focus on the care of all

Spend time in prayer for:

-those who struggle to find enough food to eat to stay healthy

-those whose drinking water is contaminated or where clean water is several hours walk away

-those who are working within their communities to provide food and comfort to people in need

Ask God's blessing on them

During the week, choose to prayer for one more local charities, such as the Food Collective, Filling Station and Harbour Project, who are a lifeline to many.



Spend time in prayer for:

-the children who have very little in their lives, locally and elsewhere

-those who will not eat a regular, healthy hot meal during half term

-those who feel lost and lonely

-those in authority who can make a difference to children's lives

Ask God's blessing on them

During the week, choose to pray for our local schools who work to nurture young people.

Use this space to add words or phrases that come to you during your time of prayer. You may have something specific to hold in your prayers and writing it down can help with keeping it as a focus. Or you may wish to draw something that is a prayer on your heart at this time.
