Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem

²⁸ After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

²⁹ When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰ saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹ If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" ³² So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. ³³ As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" ³⁴ They said, "The Lord needs it." ³⁵ Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶ As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷ As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, ³⁸ saying,

"Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!"

³⁹ Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." ⁴⁰ He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

On 11 February 2013, Pope Benedict XVI unexpectedly announced his resignation in a speech in Latin before the cardinals in Rome, citing a 'lack of strength of mind and body' due to his advanced age. He is the first pope to resign since Gregory XII in 1415, and the first to do so on his own initiative since Celestine V in 1294. He was succeeded by Cardinal Bergoglio as Pope Francis. The film *The Two Popes* (2019) is the story of the remarkable relationship between the two men. It is the story of power and humility; the ability to take up power when God requires it. And even more remarkable, maybe, to give it up when God requires it.

Jesus in the first 30 years of his life was a carpenter, apparently living an ordinary, obscure life in Nazareth. We imagine he spent his days living close to ordinary village folk, part of all their joys and challenges. Following his baptism, he recognised a call from God to leave home, and begin the life of an itinerant preacher. It must have been a big disruption for his family and village. He didn't just rush out to do this but was driven by the Spirit into the wilderness to pray through how God was wanting him to do this.

In the first part of Jesus' ministry, he powerfully seized the initiative – he was in charge. Jesus was very aware of the source of his power from God, and his words and actions were astoundingly authoritative. By any normal human standards his ministry was beyond successful, and he amazed people with his ability to cast out demons, to heal, to raise from the dead and to teach. But Jesus never forgot the source of his power. He always did what he saw His Father doing. This meant he did not conform to how the religious authorities interpreted God's way in the law: Jesus healed on the Sabbath; touched lepers; consorted with tax collectors and prostitutes.

In the film *Chariots of Fire* about the 1924 Olympics, Eric Liddell is a devout Scottish Christian who runs for the glory of God. He almost misses his opportunity to compete because when he discovers the heat for the 100 metres is on a Sunday, he refuses to run. He believed Sunday to be the Lord's Day, and that the Lord was the source of his power to run. Fortunately, an alternative race was offered to Liddell. Perhaps, this gives insight into understanding how Jesus had to do what he saw God wanting to do. His Father was the source of his power and he had to be obedient to that.

Jesus' actions profoundly rattled the religious authorities of the time, who saw Jesus as a threat to their power and authority. In the last day of Jesus' life and ministry, he allowed himself to be handed over. He allowed himself to be no longer the one taking the initiative, but the one 'done unto'. This began when he was handed over to the authorities by Judas, and then by the religious authorities to the Romans, and then to the verdict of the crowd. It ended with his crucifixion on the cross.

It seems that in the providence of God, there is a time when we have to put our hands up, put our heads above the parapet and take the initiative in order to be faithful to God. But there is also a time when God requires us to let go, and to hand over influence, sometimes maybe even unto death, to be faithful.

The challenge for those 'living in Jesus' way,' is to discern – at any particular moment – when is the moment to take up, and when is the moment to lay down. Both take courage. Both are difficult. For both, we can be very reluctant and feel our resistance. Both require God's power and guidance.
